• Change:

"There's no wind strong enough to make the boat change direction; it stays in the harbor, venturing only among still waters."

"Everything in this world has two sides. People who were abandoned by the cruel god called love are also culpable because they look into the past and wonder why they made so many plans for the future."

These quotes explain how life can be once second, as steady as a boat in still waters, worried that if it ventures out of its waters, that everything may change, or how people spend so much of their life planning what to be and what should be, when change comes it and makes them discard their future plans. This also shows Mata Hari changing her view on love, how instead of following it as a path, that she is now thinking of love as a burden or an emotion that can obey the one who feels it.

• Abuse, Freedom, and War:

"I concealed the scratches and bruises under extra makeup."

This is one of the first glimpses we get to the domestic violence faced by Mata Hari, this is a reoccuring theme and is one of the first instances we can say truly made an impression on Mata Hari's idea of love.

"My heart had stopped bleeding and was now beholding beauty in its purest form."

In this quote we could say the first part represents Mata Hari constantly feeling abused and unheard, her heart that once was filled with love, was bleeding, yet, as Mata Hari observed dance, she finally felt as though her heart was full of beauty.

"I'm not doing this for me but for all those women who are prisoners in their alleged freedom."

Freedom was said to come with marriage, however most women often felt trapped, this quote signifies that. Those women, too scared to stand up for themselves under abuse, yet to outsiders seem to have all the freedom in the world, a happy life, and love.

"Sin was not created by God; it was created by us when we tried to transform what was inevitable into something subjective. We ceased to see the whole and came to see just one part; and that part is loaded with guilt, rules, good versus evil, and each side thinking it's right."

Sin was not created by God, rather it was created by humans. When God created animals, he did not put the idea of sin into their minds. For example, animals such as coyotes and lions kill to survive, even if it means killing their own species, humans on the other hand take killing as a sin. Which is often contradicting in times of war.

The end of the quote also symbolizes how in war, each side thinks that they're in the right, because they represent their own personal ideas while disregarding the ideals of the other side. In this way, neither is exactly "good" or "bad". Wars aren't good versus evil, it just depends on the narrative the ideals are presented and the opinions of the people.

Conclusion and Recommendation:
